1 Overall result of activity

Approximately two years have passed since the WHO lifted its COVID-19 emergency declaration. The number of volunteers participating in support activities within Japan, including companies and campus chapters, has nearly doubled compared to the previous year. Corporate participation in repair projects for children's homes and shelters saw particularly significant growth, with support—including volunteer participation—received from many companies, including new participants. Meanwhile, participation in GV (Global Volunteer Program) saw a 18% decrease year-on-year to 379 participants. This decline followed an initial surge in demand immediately after the program's resumption and was further impacted by the persistent weak yen.

Project HomeWorks (domestic housing support activities), now in its ninth year, shifted focus from home-finding support to exclusively home-cleaning support for the residents. However, due to constraints in human and financial resources, the program was temporarily suspended at the end of the fiscal year.

Through these activities, we expanded our network of partners who share our organization's philosophy and the significance of our work. We also communicated widely to society about various housing issues and the importance of civic participation.
